

INTRODUCING SHEILA

Hi my name is Sheila Harris; somehow I got my arm twisted to join the HRGB North West Committee. They want a little piece about myself, so where do I start?

I think I started to ring bells about 1996 with Dean Handbell Ringers, it sounded like good fun so I had a go. I was soon hooked because I found it was fun. I started life in the reserve team (the B Team) but eventually progressed to the A team! I ring on the bass bells, mainly I think because with lifting bales of hay and bags of horse feed I have the necessary muscles.

As a team we play at retirement homes, Women's Institutes etc, probably just like the rest of you. We even played at a wedding mainly because the church didn't have any tower bells.

My first National Rally was in 1999 in Liverpool, which was certainly an eye opener; I thoroughly enjoyed it and learnt an awful lot.

In 1999 I found six old Victorian Bells in a small brown suitcase at the back of the stockroom cupboard in the local Primary school. Some didn't have handles and some didn't have clappers. The first thing I decided to do was to get them patched up. I also managed to buy a set of Belleplates for the school, and the Baby Belles school ringers were born. These children are now 27!!

Life goes on and it is surprising how proficient one becomes! Because of the way we set our bells out and play them, we have to change the bells we are ringing between pieces of music and when we are ringing at concerts we fill in that gap with poems and jokes, and yes I do that as well, I now know some good jokes!!

I also ring with Tantony Bells at Egremont and they read from music, help!! I did basic music at school but I soon learnt and enjoy ringing with them as well.

Life can be a bit hard at times, in 2008 I was diagnosed with MS. I didn't think it would affect me much, but now I can't ride my horse as far as I used to, and I get tired easily. So if you see someone asleep in the corner it is probably me.

Maghull Parish Handbell Ringers regularly attend the HRGB National Rally and A.G.M. and 2017 was to be no exception. Bookings were made, and this year some of us took up the offer of Exeter University to stay on for several days at a bargain price of £10.00 per person per night B & B. We planned to travel to Exeter in 5 vehicles with all our equipment loaded on Thursday evening ready for an early start on Friday.

Molly and I were planning to use our car but on Thursday Molly was under the weather feeling that a cold was developing. During the night the "cold" developed into a fever with a temperature of 104°F! By the morning it was obvious that she had some sort of 'Flu and was in no state to leave her bed!

The journey was uneventful except for meeting Kinder Ringers in a service station, and we arrived to a warm welcome and beautiful weather. The University has changed considerably since we were part of the International Symposium in 1988. Saturday started with the AGM which was very well organised with most of the reports being presented in written form. The last item was Nominations for Honorary Life Members. The citation prepared by Beth McCord was read out and it brought back many memories for me and allowed me time to collect my thoughts. It was a very proud moment for me when our Chairman Tim Willets presented me with a framed certificate. I responded with a few words, but I was very sad that Molly who has supported me in everything I have done was not able to be with me.

I could hardly wait to get outside to call Molly with my news, but my call went straight through to answer phone. I tried several more times to contact Molly but always got the same reply. Margaret (our regional Sales Manager) also tried a number of times, between being kept busy with the various workshops we had chosen. The evening meal was very good and set us up for the main Concert in which we played This Joyful Day (Douglas E. Wagner), The Skye Boat Song (arr. Malcolm C. Wilson), and Highland Cathedral (arr. Julie Turner). Our performance was well received and 2 people commented on our good musicality.

Molly said she thought it funny that nobody had rung all day and that her phone had been engaged! Margaret and I were much relieved to hear that Molly was feeling a lot better. She was as surprised as I had been with the Honorary Life Membership award. After all the anxiety I slept so well that I missed half of the Palm Sunday service which I should have been playing in. Molly's phone started working normally on Sunday, much to everyone's relief.

The Rally was excellent - plenty of ringing and useful workshops, very comfortable accommodation and good food. Robert, Beth and I came home on Sunday after lunch, and all the other members of the team had 3 days' holiday!

I do not want another weekend like that; I was very elated to have received the HLM award (although it would have been even better if Molly had been with me) but at the same time it was one of the most worrying times of my life. However, thanks to the help and support I received from my many handbell friends everything turned out well. Molly, I am glad to say, has now completely recovered from a nasty throat and chest infection, but she has still to regain half a stone in weight.

AND THIS IS WHAT YOU NEED TO DO TO BECOME AN HONORARY LIFE MEMBER OF HRGB!

National Honorary Life Membership Nomination for Simon Rennie of the NW Region, proposed by the NW Committee

Simon Rennie started ringing in the 1980s with the formation of the Rennie Ringers, which, as the name suggests, was a team comprising his family! It was later renamed as Maghull Parish Handbell Ringers when the team branched out to include ringers who weren't 'Rennies'. MPRH is still recognised as a large and successful team within the NW Region and Simon remains the President.

Simon was quick to get involved with HRGB and served on the regional committee for many years, appearing as a committee member on minutes as far back as 1987. He was elected as Chairman of the NW Region in 1996 and served a four year term. In 1999 the National Rally was held at Liverpool, hosted by the NW under his chairmanship. Despite passing on the Chairman's role in 2000, Simon remained on the regional committee and was elected as Treasurer in 2004. He served as NW Treasurer until 2007, but carried on to oversee the financial side of the National Rally held at Chester in 2008. He continues to support the region actively, both through rallies and encouraging Maghull Parish Handbell Ringers to attend events, take on bookings in the local area and loan equipment whenever possible.

Simon has contributed a great deal of time and commitment at a national level as well as within the NW Region. He served on NEC as National Treasurer from 1988 to 2001, which included dealing with the finances relating to the 2000 Birmingham Symposium. He also supported the organisation of the Liverpool Symposium in 2012, organising transport for delegates arriving by air.

Simon has attended several international symposia, and indeed has many handbell ringing friends all over the world. He has welcomed ringers from Canada and Japan to play with MPHR when the opportunity has arisen. He also helped to arrange accommodation and concerts when international teams have toured the UK. Further to this, Simon has continuously sought to spread the art of handbell ringing as far and as wide as possible. From ringing on the edge of the Grand Canyon at sunrise to taking MPHR on tour to Belgium to play in the market square, Simon has spent the last few decades touring the world, usually with bells in his hands, in his suitcase or even stuck in customs on the American/ Canadian border, in order to share his passion with friends and strangers alike.

We honestly don't believe he has ever met anybody and not told them about a concert or event where they would have the opportunity to listen to handbells. He has: run junior teams alongside Maghull Parish Handbell Ringers, been into local schools, churches and other groups to run teams as well as to demonstrate, encouraged organisations (including a school, a U3A group and a hospice) to invest in their own instruments and then helped them to use them. Although now he has tried to take a (slight) step back from leading Maghull Parish Handbell Ringers, he still runs the team and is highly supportive of the current junior team, most recently organising the funding of 6 juniors to attend last year's National Rally.

Simon is already an honorary member of the NW Region, however we are thrilled that his contribution has been recognised at a national level, making him an HLM of HRGB.
