also thoroughly enjoyed The Northern Bell Orchestra concert in Chester, having been made very welcome at their open rehearsal the week before.

The planning for our two autumn rallies has been underway for some weeks. Newbiggin was in the middle of October, before this edition of 'Oyez', and we still have Maghull to look forward to. Smaller autumn rallies began some years ago as a contrast to our main spring rally and AGM. In an attempt to deal with the long distances some teams have to travel, the aim was to find venues and host teams across the region. Sometimes we still describe these as 'mini rallies' and they are often, although not always, in smaller halls which tend to be rather more cosy and less daunting than a larger venue. It can mean that ringers are not quite as intimidated and nerves are not such an issue as they could be. They also tend to be rather easier to organise. Could your team help us with events in 2020?

Early in the summer I visited a church in Cheshire where I spotted a handbell team photograph on the notice board. The church warden was very keen to tell me about the team and the bells and the following day I was at a Craft Show in Leigh and one of the stall holders rang handbells. I directed them both to our regional and national web-sites - you never know what their searches may lead to. Jeanette Jenkins, our web-site expert, has also set up an HRGB NW facebook page. In the last few weeks I have seen publicity for handbell ringing as part of a weekend of community-led events, in libraries in Urmston, near Manchester and Longridge, near Preston; also for upcoming concerts which include handbell ringing. You may have views about social media but I've recently come to realize that it offers publicity opportunities not to be dismissed. Do contact Jeanette if there's anything your team would like to let the wider world know about. Use her expertise – she's willing to give it! I also noticed that St Clement's, Urmston, have a 'handbell ringing group' section on their church web-site. Well done to them and your team too, if you've done the same. Be inspired, if you are part of somewhere that has a web-site. Our journal is also very important and editor, David Kerry, is always looking for contributions. organization, its magazine is all the more enjoyable because there are interesting, funny, quirky and informative things in it. How about sending something in for the next edition in the spring?...

Whether or not the wider handbell scene is your thing isn't important. What is, is how good it is to share skills and talents with others, to enjoy making music while taking a break from those busy times in our lives and to know the rewarding feeling that by rehearsing together, a piece that seemed challenging some weeks (or even months...) before takes on a whole new aspect. The old comment "handbells sound lovely at Christmas" springs to mind but, as we all know, they also sound lovely all year round. As the coming weeks become busier and life tends to go up a notch, take a moment to appreciate the opportunities handbell ringing brings.

#### **AUTUMN RALLIES - WOULD YOUR TEAM HOST ONE?**

Before you answer "No way!" please read on ...

The Committee organises the Spring Rally and AGM (held on the same day) and usually, an event in the summer. However, in the Autumn we have two mini-rallies, one at each end of the Region, and we rely on teams volunteering to host these events.

### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS .....

### Where do we start?

You would receive a whole package of information and advice on how to run a rally, including sample letters, booking form and checklist of things to do. The first sentence of the guidelines reads "YOU ARE NOT ALONE" and we mean it! If any queries or problems arise, you will have the Committee's contact details and you just get in touch.

## Will it cost the team money?

Definitely not! Rallies usually make a small surplus, but provided you follow the guidelines in running the Rally, any shortfall is covered by the Region. Even better, the finances from both Rallies are added together and any surplus is shared equally between each host team and the Region, subject to a **minimum of £50** to your team for hosting the Rally.

### How many people would we need on the day?

You will need people to run refreshments (drinks and biscuits – anything more than that is up to you), to "meet and greet", to tell everyone what happens next and to run the raffle if you decide to have one. You can organise other activities if you want to, but this is entirely voluntary.

### What about music and conductors?

Each host team chooses one piece of massed ringing music and the Committee chooses a third. Then all three pieces are used at both Rallies. If you need help with this, or in finding conductors, you contact the Committee – that's what we're there for!

If you have any other questions, talk to a Committee member (contact details in this edition of Oyez). We are looking for teams to host the two Autumn Rallies in October / November 2020, so please give some thought to this.

### **MUSICAL DIRECTORS' SEMINAR**

The first HRGB Musical Directors' Seminar took place in 2018, and was a great success. HRGB is planning another weekend Seminar in the autumn of 2020, so look out for details in Reverberations or on the HRGB website. Bags packed, tickets in hand, bells on board – Bishops' Handbell Ringers, with our Team Director, Mr. Derek Jackson and Mrs. Jackson, were off to Germany! We had the privilege of visiting Chester's twin town, Lörrach -situated in the valley of the Weise in Southwest Germany. Lörrach is a beautiful little town that lies right next to the French, Swiss and German borders, surrounded on the North side by the famous Black Forest.

Arriving at the airport, we were greeted with open arms by our soon-to-be German families. We were overwhelmed by the kindness they showed us in giving us accommodation, providing us with transport around the town and serving us delicious, traditional German foods. Immersing ourselves into German culture and 'typical' family-life was an unforgettably wonderful experience that broadened my outlook of the world and will hopefully stay with me for the rest of my life.

We were honoured to play the bells during the local Sunday church service. Since very few of the team could speak more than a few words of German, however, the service itself was quite a challenge to follow at times. Fortunately the minster had arranged the service partly in German and partly in English - with Mrs. Jackson doing an English reading and I read some prayers in English. The congregation were incredibly accommodating of our ignorance, and the round of applause we received at the end of the service was incredibly humbling.

Following the service, we packed up our bells and walked a couple hundred metres down the road to the neighbouring Catholic church which would be the venue for our concert with the local youth orchestra later on that evening. The support we received during the concert was phenomenal. The Church was packed – it appeared all of Lörrach's residents and local dignitaries had come out to

watch our amazing 'Handglocken' team perform. As Germany has very few Handbell teams, if any at all, most people had never had the pleasure of listening to the joys of Handbells before. We played a wide range of pieces, from the fast-paced 'Cubley Brook' to my personal favourite 'Di Tanjong Katong' — a Singaporean folk song. However, the highlight of the evening was our final piece - 'Let there be Peace on Earth' which we played with Lörrach's youth orchestra. There was something very enlightening about playing such a beautiful piece alongside our young German counterparts; it was truly heart-warming to find unity in music during what often feels like a time of frequent division. The experiences we had and the friendships we formed were genuinely incredible, and I look forward to a day, hopefully in the near future, when I can go back to this emotional, but also wonderful corner of the world again.

Alongside the pleasure of playing in the concert, we had great fun exploring the local attractions with a trip to the 'Hasenhorn Rodelbahn'- - the longest mountain roller coaster in Europe, situated in the enchanting Black Forest. We also spent a day in the neighbouring Swiss city of Basle.

Overall, we had a fantastic time in Lörrach, which meant saying goodbye on the last day was incredibly difficult. I can't express in words how thankful I am to the host families for accommodating us and showing us all such a wonderful time.

Finally – **PLASTIC OUT, CUPS IN** – This was so popular at the Spring Rally that we decided at the AGM to make it the Region's policy for all future events.


