FROM KINDER RINGERS - A BUSY DAY, CHRISTMAS 2022

During the morning of our double-concerts day it started to snow. Whilst it may have looked festive the fact that our ringers are scattered throughout the High Peak area could have been a nightmare. However, Mother Nature was on our side as the roads had cleared in time for us to make our first journey, which was to a Care Home in Congleton. Once there, we were warmly greeted by the organiser for whom we had played at his previous Care Home pre-Covid. More than 25 residents were duly assembled and joined in enthusiastically whenever possible, singing and clapping along to all the carols and Christmas songs. A welcome drink and chocolate biscuits ended the afternoon with promises to book us again for 2023.

The weather had improved for our journey back to Stockport where we just had time for a brief stop at Anne's to have our packed teas, and some of Emma's cake, before continuing to our evening engagement. This has become an annual Christmas booking with an a capella choir from Stockport, although we had also joined them in a recent concert in October which raised £643.00 for the British-Ukrainian appeal.

A lovely warm church awaited us along with a large audience, despite the event clashing with the World Cup Final. (Would it have been the case if England had been involved?) It has become traditional now for us to accompany the choir in their opening song, *Ukrainian Bell Carol*, better known to us as *Carol of the Bells*. This lively piece set the tone for a very varied evening of music. We began our first solo spot with Robin Benton's *Jingle Bells Fantasia*, a piece we have enjoyed working on in recent months. We followed it with *In the Bleak Midwinter* and *Joy to the World*. After playing his solo a guitarist joined the choir for *The Story of Silent Night*, a very appropriate and moving telling of the historic beginnings of this favourite carol. The ladies of the choir then sang the first verse in German, as it was originally performed in 1818, before we were all invited to join in.

During the interval we were kept up-to-date with the football score and also the rather disturbing news, plus photos, of a white-out in Disley, which fortunately had improved by the time we had to set off for home.



The second half of the programme began with *In the Silence*, a choir piece accompanied by oboe and bell chimes, before we played our second set of solos. This was followed by *Christmastime*, another song we have now traditionally been invited to accompany, which went well despite very little rehearsal with the choir. Our final involvement came in supplying the percussion parts for *Feliz Navidad*, a fun piece which ended a successful evening and another invite to take part again next Christmas. We had had a frantic few weeks reorganising the team and including 2 ringers making their debut Christmas performances with us, but felt we had ended the year on a high.

The Quartet also undertook some daytime events, at each the audiences enthusiastically joining in which makes it more enjoyable for us. At a WI concert our planned programme was changed for us by a request for particular carols. Fortunately we found that, when things are going so well, it is possible to oblige, even without rehearsal!

NORBURY HR - AN AFTERNOON AT THE MUSEUM

This Christmas, Norbury Handbell Ringers were asked to perform at Macclesfield Silk Museum as part of their Christmas Activity Programme. It was unusual to be playing among some venerable pieces of historic machinery, including the Ribbon Loom which produced tags for Doc Marten Boots. The museum also has the original Jacquard Loom responsible for producing the famous Macclesfield silk scarves, buttons, pictures and even silk maps used by RAF parachutists in the Second World War.



The visit allowed us to browse the shop for last minute handmade Christmas presents and enjoy a cup of tea from the Vintage Tea Room. Having decided to play our bigger Christmas pieces it was quite a challenge getting five tables into the Blue gallery to accommodate the bigger bells. Carl's height came in handy for adjusting the museum mood lighting to focus on our music. The concert went down well, particularly with the Probus Club who had made it their mission to visit and asked some very intelligent questions.

On the 24th November we were invited to play for the Thursday Club at Ullock Village Hall. Eight Ringers were able to attend. We included a selection from the Sound of Music, Finale from Handel's Firework suite, Crimond / Now is the Hour, Winter from Vivaldi's Four Seasons, and Jingle Bell Rock.



Our Christmas Concert was held on 3rd December at the Methodist Church, Keswick, for the closing Carol service of their Christmas Tree Festival. We rang some solos, some pieces for the audience to sing along to, and some pieces accompanied by a lady on the piano (a new experience for us), again with the audience invited to join in. We had a visitor from Essex, who had contacted Norma - Susan Duke, Secretary of the East Anglia Region (*see photo below*). Yes, a Bell Ringer also, who was at Keswick on holiday at the time. We invited her to



ring our last carol with us, and boy, she was a good strong ringer! We rang Winter, Jingle Bell Rock, O Come All Ye Faithful, Infant Holy, Away in a Manger, Jingle Bells and We wish you a Merry Christmas.

On 6th December, we were playing at Clarendon Grange Care Home, Clifton, Near Workington. This was a new venue for us and the best audience participation ever, same programme as our 3rd December concert.

Finally, on 12th December, Holmethwaite House, Keswick. The journey through to Keswick was just spectacular to say

the least. Picture postcard, all the trees, lake and mountains breathtaking. Once again we repeated our previous programme, and an enjoyable time was had by all.

TWO OPPORTUNITIES TO LOOK BACK TO THE OLDEN DAYS

An interesting piece from Handbell Ringing by CW Fletcher 1888, chapter III "The Players". This should give ringers a few chuckles!

"It will not be necessary to delay the formation of your company till the bells are delivered, and here, on the threshold of our venture a question rises which has been agitating the body politic for years – "Women's Rights." It has hitherto been the almost invariable custom to exclude ladies from participation in the pleasures of handbell ringing, and before deciding whether they shall or shall not form part of the company there are numerous points to be taken into consideration. First of all, it would not do to have only one; her position would neither be agreeable to herself, nor conducive of the best harmony amongst the "male items" of the company. We arrive at this point, therefore, that if we admit ladies at all there must be at least two of them. And, why not? Their presence (especially if goodlooking) will add an additional charm to an already attractive entertainment, and what more appropriate when there are *belles* to be rung than that the ladies should be there."

Now Don't Glaze Over...

Some time ago, I had the opportunity to trawl through some early *Reverberations* (ie from November 1969) and made a few notes, thinking they may at some point fill a space in one of our issues of *Oyez*. I came across them recently whilst looking for something else (as you do) and thought I'd share some facts and figures. Perhaps I need to get out more, but they proved rather fascinating. I hope you find them as 'interesting' as I do!

There are many references to some 'early' teams with whom many of us are so familiar, including Higher Walton, St Mary's Reddish and Norbury, and details of who attended National Rallies and played in the evening concerts. They record an increasing number of registered teams, the cost of membership fees, adverts for sets of bells for sale and early HRGB merchandise and even music.

As of 1st Nov 1969, 535 individual members were registered with HRGB across 27 English counties and 1 in N.Ireland.

Apologies to those who don't understand the following (this being pre-decimal):

Advertisements in *Reverberations* cost 1/- a line

Individual Adult HRGB membership was 2/6 per annum with Juniors at 1/6 and Life-Membership was £1-0-0. Badges were 4/- including postage.

By November 1970 there were 90 registered teams. The opportunity of paying a Life Membership to 'get the Society off-the-ground' ended and they were now to be known as Founder Members. The seemingly long-awaited HRGB ties would be available by the end of the year at the cost of 22/6.

The first suggestion of 4 regions appeared – NE, NW, SE & SW.

The notice of membership costs reflects decimalisation (beginning on 15th Feb 1971) as Adults 5/- (25p), Juniors 2/- (10p) and Team Registration 10/- (50p)

500 people were present at the Annual Rally in May 1971 which was at Lancaster Town Hall. The following year saw 800 applicants for the National Rally in Cambridge. By September 1971, the number of registered teams had risen to above 100 for the first time.

The April 1972 issue includes a serious concern that @ 6p per copy, the two issues per year of *Reverberations* used up half the annual adult subscription. 12 months later it is noted that the cost of printing it has risen to £61.50.

For anyone thinking the issues of one-member teams and payments are new...

'With effect from January 1973, each team Secretary or Treasurer to be issued with a receipt which will show the number of members of each type paid for. On the reverse side, there would be a list of individual members.' Apparently during the previous year 'many teams' were not paying their subscriptions until September or October. *(Tut tut!!)*

I'll leave you to imagine how much time must have been spent making the decision that from January 1974, subscriptions were raised to 35p (Adults) / 20p (Juniors). Clearly it wasn't an issue as by then there were 147 registered teams, with just over 1000 members.
