Treading the Boards; a Different Sort of Christmas Carol

Sale Handbell Ringers have been playing at various engagements in and around Sale for over 30 years now, but never before had we been involved in any sort of theatrical performance. November 2023 changed all that. Some months earlier we had been approached by a local theatre to take part in their production of *A Christmas Carol*. Initially the producer had visualised us enthusiastically ringing our bells as we made our dramatic entry down through the auditorium during the final scene which, after the very 'dark' drama earlier, would be full of colour, joyful carol singing, handbell ringing, general happiness, presents being exchanged, snow falling over everybody, and Scrooge handing out humbugs to cast and audience alike. As we play off-table, our entry through the auditorium obviously was not going to work so in the production we played on stage wearing Victorian costumes (think Quality Street Chocolate adverts including the bonnets)



It was definitely a different experience; our usual performances are to small groups and it was certainly a change to be part of a much larger production and facing an audience of about 400 every night of the week – plus a matinee on the Saturday afternoon. The theatre was booked to capacity for every performance, and although we like to think it was because word had got out that we were performing, in actual fact, we have to admit that it might have been something to do with A Christmas Carol being one of the set books for GCSE this year. As a result there were lots of young people in the audience and they definitely enjoyed the play if the applause and whoops were anything to go by. The production even got standing ovations on several nights. We played a rather flashy version of the Boar's Head Carol, arranged for handbells by Kevin McChesney giving us chance to show off various ringing techniques and effects, such as tower swings, echoes, thumb damping etc and finishing off with a triumphant and much practised coordinated gyro. We then played, predictably, Ding, Dong Merrily on High for people to sing to, and concluded the show with the handbell arrangement of The Trumpet Voluntary, arranged by Martha Lynn Thompson which works extremely well on handbells. Who knew? Certainly not Jeremiah Clarke the original composer, or the trumpet wouldn't have got a look in!



So would we do something like that again? Yes definitely; although we couldn't have done it without our MD, Kate's musical ability and leadership. Despite a few misgivings along the way, we really enjoyed being part of the larger team that worked together to put on the play. It strengthened us as a team, musically and in the way the team bonded as we focussed on how our playing fitted into the whole production. Handbell ringing is essentially a team activity, but this set us new challenges and gave us interesting insights into the much wider teamwork involved in staging a dramatic production such as *A Christmas Carol*.

CHRISTMAS 2024 AT NORBURY



It was lovely to see how beautifully the homes were decorated for Christmas and that we had added to their celebrations.



Albert Graham 1936 – 2023

Sale Handbell Ringers were saddened by the death in October 2023 of Albert Graham who was one of its founder members. When his wife, Judith and Mo Morris were initially inspired to set up the Group and acquire a set of handbells in 1990, Albert became its Treasurer, a position he held continuously until 2022 even after illness prevented him from taking part in regular rehearsals and performances.

Albert was a very special person. He cared about people and they loved him. He was a highly respected Methodist Local Preacher and his whole life was underpinned by his deep and thoughtful Christian faith. Born in Nenthead near Alston, Albert remained a proud Cumbrian and supporter of Carlisle United (as well as later, Liverpool F.C.) all his life. His life journey took him from Cumbria to Liverpool University, and then, via Yorkshire where he met and married Judith, on to Nigeria before it eventually brought him to Sale as a Geography teacher at Sale Boys Grammar School.



Albert & Judith were very much a team; proud and loving parents of Ruth and Andrew and later as grandparents to their five grandchildren. The hospitality they offered to visitors to their home was always warm, generous and, above all, fun. Indeed, the Handbell Ringers weekly rehearsals took place in their kitchen for about the first 20 years of our existence until the numbers in the Group increased and there just wasn't room for everybody to fit into the kitchen any more. Rehearsals were always followed by tea, coffee, delicious biscuits a lot of conversation and laughter, and were a time of team bonding when individuals became part of the team, and friendships developed.

Thank you, Albert, for all you contributed to helping Judith and Mo's bell-ringing dream become a reality, and enabling so many others to enjoy the pleasures of handbell ringing.

AN APPEAL FOR INFORMATION - CAN YOU HELP?

There will probably be further information about this in Reverberations, later in the year.

Another interesting piece from the book, 'Handbell Ringing' by CW Fletcher 1888, Chapter III "The Players"

"I have often been asked why the number of ringers in a company is always five? Whether there is any special advantage gained in not having six? The answer is simply that "there are reasons" which make professional ringers prefer that number, but there are none whatever to prevent local bands having as many as they wish, except that each player requires a certain amount of elbow room.

I recommend, therefore, that the company shall consist of five performers, of whom two shall be (if desired) ladies, care being taken that each one is physically fairly strong, possesses plenty of perseverance, and above all, is an excellent reader of music so far as the notation of time is concerned. Having brought our company together it will be necessary to explain that the strongest should be selected to play the bass part, the two more reliable readers to play the treble between them, the alto and tenor will then fall to the share of the two ladies, who will then occupy the post of honour in the centre of the table where these bells are always placed."

Towards the end of the book there is a piece about change ringing.

"The first is called a "Plain Course of Stedman's Doubles." It consists of 60 changes, rung upon five bells, and was invented by Mr. Fabian Stedman abut the year 1640."

Guess what our team are going to have a go at !!
